

# Greater London bus maps by day and night

The best recommendation we can make of a publication is that it is an essential source of reference in the Buses office. That is the case with the LOTS London Fleetbook and so it is also with the Greater London Bus Map.

You may choose to use it as a map to see where buses go, which after all is a prime purpose of a map. We use it most months to consult the accompanying numerical listings to establish the termini and operator of a route, especially at times when announcements are made of

when tendered services change hands. All of which simply proves that this is a dependable information resource we would not like to be without.

As ever, it is produced in the style of the maps that London Transport produced as official information in the late 1970s, showing what today are Transport for London tendered routes in red (on accurate representations of twisting and turning roads) and what would have been Country Area routes in green.
